<u>6th Sunday of Matthew (the paralytic):</u> The Lord desires to see something from man, in order that He might act. It says here: "*He saw their faith*". The paralytic was not able on his own to go to the Lord. For this reason, he was brought by others, and the Lord saw their faith. Still, he means here that in some way He also saw the faith of the paralytic. He, the paralytic, would not have come to the Lord if he had not believed. And, immediately, the Lord said: "*Son, be of good cheer; your sins are forgiven you*".

On another occasion, Christ said: "As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world". On this occasion it is as though He were saying: "I am here to **heal** man of his **bodily illness**, but first and foremost to heal him of sin, the sickness of the **soul**". It is a big deal to feel that your sins are forgiven, that God forgives you, and that He has accepted you. Just as your blood circulates through your veins, in this same way you ought to feel God's forgiveness, circulating through you.

Not one of us should have even the smallest **doubt** that if the Lord sees our faith, He will immediately answer and straightway give us His forgiveness, i.e., that which we are seeking. In order though for the Lord to forgive you, you have to arrive at the point of saying: "My God, I do not want to sin anymore."



Father Kai will celebrate the Feast of Transfiguration with a Vesperal Liturgy on Monday, August 5th @ 6"00 pm The Transfiguration of Christ (August 6th,) is one of the central events recorded in the gospels. Immediately after the Lord was recognized by His apostles as "the Christ [Messiah], the Son of the Living God," He told them that "He must go up to Jerusalem and suffer many things.. and be killed and on the third day be raised" (Mt 16). The announcement of Christ's approaching passion and death was met with indignation by the disciples. And then, after rebuking them, the Lord took Peter, James, and John "up to a high mountain"—by tradition Mount Tabor—

and was "transfigured before them."

In the Transfiguration, the apostles see the glory of the Kingdom of God present in majesty in the person of Christ they see that "in Him, indeed, all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell," that "in Him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily" (Col 1.19, 2.9). They see this before the crucifixion so that in the resurrection they might know Who it is Who has suffered for them, and what it is that this one, Who is God, has prepared for those who love Him. This is what the Church celebrates in the feast of the Transfiguration.
